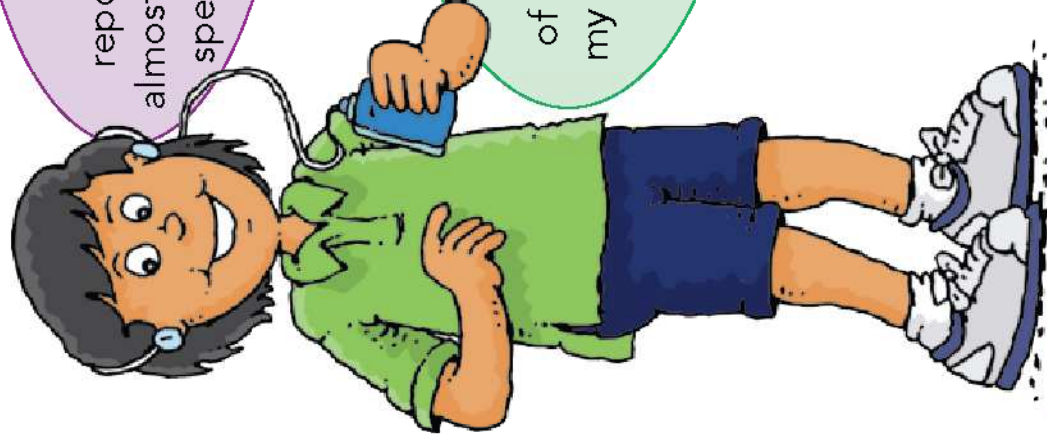


Parts of a Factual Report

A factual report is a paper that tells facts about a topic. It can be about anything that interests me. It can be about a person, a place, a thing, an event, or something else!



Topic

Facts

Introduction
This is the beginning of the report. I tell the topic of my paper and catch the reader's attention in this part.

Body
This is the longest part of the report. I tell facts about my topic in this part.

Conclusion
This is the end of the report. I sum up the main point of my report in this part.

Reasons for Writing a Factual Report

Here are some reasons to write a factual report.

To share information

When I learn something new or important, I like to tell others about it in a factual report. Then, they can learn about it, too.

To answer questions

A factual report is a great way to answer questions I have about something. I can look in books to find answers. Then, I can tell what I have learned.

To entertain

A factual report can be fun to read and write. I can make my topic interesting for the reader by including unusual or surprising facts. I can tell about a cool event that the reader might like to experience, such as going to a concert or visiting a museum.
