Instructional lift

At Hillcrest Elementary, students' language skills continue to advance, thanks to *The Superkids Reading Program™*. Research-based reading and writing instruction focuses on teaching a predictable progression of skills for primary students. Hillcrest principal Jennifer Barrow explains, "I see teachers getting better and better at trusting the program" because of its proven foundation in research on reading and writing development. Writing with Superkids

Hillcrest teachers and administrators especially appreciate the ongoing development of the writing component of *Superkids*. "Students are making great strides in writing," says Barrow. Based on research, the literacy instruction in *Superkids* spirals. In kindergarten, students focus on learning each letter through four means—hear it, see it, say it, write it—on their way to reading and writing more complex sentences. This makes them consistently successful with decoding and encoding words as well as writing.

Hillcrest teachers and administrators know the program works. "Superkids really breaks it down," says Barrow, "especially in kindergarten. In other programs, there's a rush with invented spelling the first week of school, but we've got to slow it down and talk about letter formation and the sound a letter makes." That way, students create a firm foundation for writing as well as reading.

The progression of skills in *Superkids* leads directly to solid writing skills. "Our writing scores are continuing to increase," curriculum specialist Kim Griffiths adds.





Writing that supports comprehension

Superkids also gets high marks for writing activities that support reading comprehension. Hillcrest teachers explain that students are showing progress in decoding text and reading independently. "We absolutely love the Book Talk Journals and how they get the kids ready for more analytical thinking types of questions," says Griffiths.

Griffiths adds, "The Book Club really prepares them for third grade. Our intermediate reading program does nothing but real literature, so we appreciate that second grade has that Book Club to bridge them to third grade. That way it's not such a big curriculum jump for our children."
